REPORT OF THE PARLIAMENTARY SELECT COMMITTEE ON YOUTH, SPORTS AND CULTURE ON THE 2021 ANNUAL BUDGET ESTIMATES FOR THE MINISTRY OF CHIEFTAINCY AND RELIGIOUS AFFAIRS

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Budget Estimates of the Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs for 2021 were referred to the Select Committee on Youth, Sports and Culture for consideration and report pursuant to Order 140 (4) of the Standing Orders of the House. This followed the presentation to Parliament of the 2021 Budget Statement and Economic Policy of the Government in accordance with Article 179 of the 1992 Constitution and Order 140 (2) of the Standing Orders of the House.

The Committee met with the Minister for Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs, Hon. Ebenezer Kojo Kum, The Chief Director and the Heads of Departments and Agencies, as well as officers from the Ministry of Finance to consider the estimates, and reports as follows:

3.0 <u>VISION AND MISSION OF THE MINISTRY</u>

The Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs exists to operate as the primary and apex body in policy formulation, implementation and co-ordination in the Chieftaincy and Religious Sectors. The Ministry pursues the prime objective of safeguarding the values that promote and enhance a stable, united and safe society, thereby creating opportunities for all Ghanaians to build a prosperous nation. The prime objective is that the Ministry sets the framework and the necessary mechanism to ensure that the Chieftaincy and Religious bodies promote and enhance peace and the environment that create the space for government and government institutions to bring and spread development to the citizenry.



The Vision of the Ministry is to preserve, sustain and integrate the regal and traditional values and religious practices to accelerate wealth creation and harmony for total national development.

4.0 **FUNCTIONS OF THE MINISTRY**

The Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs exists to undertake the following functions:

- I. Initiate and formulate policies as well as programs geared towards the promotion of the Chieftaincy Institution, religious tolerance and good governance, taking into account the needs and aspirations of the people;
- II. Undertake development planning in consultation with the National Development Planning Commission (NDPC);
- III. Co-ordinate, monitor and evaluate the efficiency and effectiveness of the sector;
- IV. Co-ordinate the activities and programs of the National and Regional Houses of Chiefs and religious bodies towards the development of the Chieftaincy and Religious Sectors; and
- V. To undertake the progressive study, interpretation and codification of customary law with the view of evolving in appropriate cases, a unified system of rules of customary law and compilation of lines of succession applicable to each stool and skin.

To carry out its mandate and ensure that the Chieftaincy and Religious bodies promote and enhance a peaceful, congenial environment that creates the opportunity for government institutions to pursue the prime object of bringing development for all, the Ministry is pursuing two main programs – Management and Administration and Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs.

4.1 MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

Under this programme, the Ministry undertakes activities that ensure that it is follows directives and meets set targets. These include:

- > The drawing up of the annual budget and the related action plan;
- > Securing the funding from budgetary allocation to ensure the smooth administration of the Ministry and the entities operating under it;
- > Ensuring the effective delivery of services to the citizenry;
- > In line with ensuring quality human resource, build capacity of the staff for efficient delivery and performance; and
- > Undertake initiation, development, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of the Ministry's policies, programmes and activities.

4.2 CHIEFTAINCY AND RELIGIOUS AFFAIRS

This programme encapsulates Chieftaincy Management and Religion for Development

I. <u>Chieftaincy Management</u>

This programme is to manage the Chieftaincy Institution so as to uphold its dignity, and make an important ingredient in creating the values and environment for government to implement its development programmes as well as to be drivers in harnessing citizen participation in the development effort. In pursuit of the activity the Ministry

- ➤ Undertakes research this includes the collection of data, and the codification of lines of succession and related functions;
- ➤ Inaugurates traditional councils in traditional areas This permits traditional authority be a part of the governance process;
- > Supervises the adjudication of Chieftaincy matters this is to ensure that the adjudication process is effective;
- > Creates the forum for government officials to engage with traditional authorities on policies and programmes; and
- > Enables traditional authorities to contribute to the socio-cultural and economic development of the country.

II. Religion for Development

The Religion for development programme is to enable religious bodies inculcate values that encourage the citizenry to be patriotic and be a part of the development process. It is also enable religious bodies to intensify and contribute to national development through the provision of infrastructure and the pursuing of health, education and agricultural programmes.

Activities pursued under this programme include;

- > promoting dialogue in, and between faith to enable and appreciate peace and cohesion;
- > enable the pursuit of pilgrimage locally and abroad to deepen faith, values and beliefs for human and national development;
- > create and enable appreciation of religious sites and their influence in development; and
- > enable religious bodies deepen involvement in the social, cultural and economic development of the country.

5.0 IMPLEMENTING DEPARTMENTS AND AGENCIES

The Ministry has a Headquarters with six (6) Directorates. These are:

- I. Finance and Administration
- II. Policy Planning Monitoring and Evaluation
- III. Human Resources Management
- IV. Research
- V. Internal Audit
- VI. Chieftaincy & Religious Affairs

In addition to the above, the Ministry oversees the operations of

- I. The National House of Chiefs
- II. Sixteen (16) Regional Houses of Chiefs
- III. Two hundred and eight (208) Traditional Councils
- IV. Four Divisional Councils
- V. Oversees the management of Christian, Islamic and other Religious bodies.

6.0 THE YEAR 2020 IN RETROSPECT

The Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs' approved budget for 2020 was in the amount of thirty-four million, five hundred and twelve thousand, one hundred fifty-five Cedis (\$\psi 34,512,155.00) for its activities. An amount of forty-two million, five hundred and sixty-six thousand, ninety Cedis and eighty-seven pesewas (\$\psi 42,566,090.87\$) was released and forty-two million, eight hundred and eight thousand, one hundred and eighty-two Cedis and sixty-nine pesewas (\$\psi 42,808,182.69\$) was utilized, leaving a surplus of eight million, two hundred and ninety-six thousand, twenty-seven Cedis and sixty-nine pesewas (\$\psi 8,296,027.69\$).

The Ministry expended an additional amount of $$\psi 8,053,935.87$$ without parliamentary approval during the year under review. Of this amount, the $$\note 7,425,756.00$$ released for Employee Compensation is made up of outstanding allowances for Chiefs and an increase in staff in 2019, which was paid in 2020. The amount of $$\note 961,256.00$$ constitutes a Capital Expenditure (CaPEx) allocation.

6.1 ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2020

I. Management and Administration

> Reconstitution of the Membership of the Houses of Chiefs

In the year in review, 2020 the Ministry in line with the legal requirement reconstituted the membership of the Regional House of Chiefs, with the passage of the Chieftaincy (membership of the Regional House of Chiefs) Instrument, 2020 L.I 2409. This was significant, particularly in view of the creation of six (6) new regions, and which by necessary implication meant that each Regional House of Chiefs shall have its membership in compliance with constitutional provision.

> Inauguration of Regional Houses of Chiefs

To enable the functioning of the six (6) new Regions created, which are Bono East, Savannah, Oti, Ahafo, Western North and North East, Six Regional House of Chiefs were inaugurated. The necessary enabling administrative structures to support the Six (6) Regional House of Chiefs have been put in place.

II. CHIEFTAINCY AFFAIRS

Chieftaincy Declaration (C.D) Forms Recommended and Approved by the National House of Chiefs

The National House of Chiefs had recommended and approved four hundred and ninety-one (491) Chieftaincy Declaration (CD) Forms for entry into the National Register of Chiefs. These will soon be gazetted. The objective of the exercise is to report the current status of persons as chiefs in Ghana.

Digitization of Records

The digitization programme of record in the National House of Chiefs were continued. The programme would be replicated in the other Houses of Chiefs. The essence is the preservation of the records of the House of Chiefs.

Meetings of the Regional and National House of Chiefs

The COVID-19 pandemic affected programmes and quarterly meetings of the Houses of Chiefs. However, since the easing of restrictions, it has been possible to hold other meetings of the various Houses of Chiefs and the National House of Chiefs. The meetings are critical in the management of the chieftaincy institution. It permits the discussion of very critical issues and creates opportunities for government official and policy makers to engage with them on a wide range of issues.

> Adjudication of Chieftaincy Disputes

The Judicial Committee of the House of Chiefs were able to adjudicate and dispose of One Hundred and Four (104) of the Chieftaincy disputes that were pending before the various Judicial Committees.

III. RELIGIOUS AFFAIRS

The facilitation of Christian Pilgrimage, which is a major programme of the Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs, was truncated as a result of the Covid-19 outbreak. The Ministry however completed the framework to regulate and enhance the Pilgrimage both locally and abroad.

7.0 CHALLENGES DURING THE YEAR UNDER REVIEW

- I. <u>Inadequate funds</u> whilst elaborate programmes were designed for implementation, resources which were already inadequate, were also not released in time. It was therefore difficult, in most cases, to achieve set goals.
- II. <u>Inadequate logistics</u> the various Houses of Chiefs and traditional councils do not have the full compliment of logistics, necessary for effective and efficient functioning.
- III. <u>Adjudication of Cases</u> the adjudication of chieftaincy matters before the judicial committees is always delayed for two main reasons. First because the various Houses of Chiefs do not have adequate legal counsel. It has been difficult recruiting lawyers because of unattractive remuneration. Secondly, the inability of some panel members to attend scheduled meetings made it difficult to dispose of cases in an early or speedy manner.

8.0 BUDGETARY ALLOCATION FOR 2021

Even though the Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs budgeted for an amount of One hundred and ninety-seven million, seventy-three thousand, five hundred and ninety-nine Cedis and nine pesewas (GH¢ 197,073,599.09), only an amount of Thirty-five million, seven hundred and thirty-nine thousand, two hundred and eighty-eight Cedis (GH¢ 35,739,288.00) has been allocated for its activities in 2021.

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8.1 **GOALS FOR 2021**

Some of the Ministry's goals for 2021 are as follows:

I. Automation in the Adjudication of Chieftaincy Cases at the Houses of Chiefs

The Ministry would automate the various Houses of Chiefs to ensure speedy, effective and efficient adjudication of Chieftaincy disputes at the judicial committees of the National and Regional Houses of Chiefs.

II. Stakeholder engagement to build a DNA Genealogy Database

The Ministry would have stakeholder engagement on building a DNA genealogy database for lines of succession to stools and skins at the various traditional areas.

III. <u>Production of compendium on aspects of chieftaincy</u> – The Ministry would set the framework to enable the compilation of materials on aspects of Chieftaincy and traditional authority for the production of compendia. This when completed would provide the necessary information and knowledge to impact on the Chieftaincy Institution.

IV. Mapping of sites for local Christian pilgrimage

The Ministry would map out sites relevant for local Christian pilgrimage. This will enhance faith, understanding and appreciation of Christian history and its impact on education, health, agriculture and various aspect of life in the country. It will also enhance local tourism, appreciation of Christian architecture, historical sites and literature.

V. Improvement in the implementation of Christian pilgrimage

The Ministry would improve on the participation of Christian pilgrimage, both locally and internationally, by implementing the directives on Christian pilgrimage.

VI. Inter faith dialogues strengthened

The Ministry would pursue inter faith dialogues, broaden the scope of discussions and collaboration within the overall context of how religion may enhance national development and cohesion.

VII. Conduct of 2021 Annual Audit

Conduct a full audit at all the Regional Houses of Chiefs and Traditional Councils.

VIII. Lines of succession to stools and skins

The Ministry would undertake research and administer instruments in the codification of lines of succession to stools and skins in the traditional areas.

IX. Compilation of customary laws on Traditional Areas

The Ministry would set the framework to enable the identification and compilation of customary laws in selected traditional areas, in particular customary laws applicable to each stool or skin.

X. Enhance and strengthen adjudicatory mechanisms

The Ministry would continue with its programme of resolving chieftaincy matters through Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR). There would also be capacity building of the judicial committee members and the production of relevant documents to facilitate dispute resolution.

XI. Traditional Authorities in governance

Traditional councils would be inaugurated to enhance the contribution of traditional authorities in the governance process. There would also be increased engagement with traditional authorities so they may play more critical roles in the spread of development.

9.0 OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee made the following observations and recommendations during the consideration of the 2021 budget estimates of the Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs:

I. Inadequate funds for the Ministry

The Committee was informed that the Ministry was unable to undertake a number of its planned activities due to inadequate funding. Indeed, for 2021, the Ministry requested a total of one hundred and ninety-seven million, seventy-three thousand, five hundred and ninety-nine Cedis and nine Pesewas (¢197,073,599.09) but has been allocated only 18.13% thereof, in the amount of thirty-five million, seven hundred and thirty-nine thousand, two hundred and eighty-eight Cedis (¢35,739,288.00). For CapEx, 0.8% of the proposed budget for 2021 has been allocated, while for 2020, there was no allocation whatsoever for Capex, even in the face of catering for six new Regions.

The Committee considers this most unfortunate because it is the activities of the ministry, which help to avert conflict and abate disputes through education and the neutral adjudication of chieftaincy matters. It is therefore vital that the Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs be well resourced to carry out its mandate.

In addition to this, the Committee would like the Minister of Finance to note that the creation of the new Regions means new administrative set-ups and new Houses of Chiefs. This translates into the employment of more staff and the provision of logistics, and, this requires more Capital Expenditure.

II. Budgetary Over-run

The Committee also observed, with worry, that the Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs utilized more funds than were approved in the 2020 budget, without having these funds approved by Parliament, as law demands. This keeps recurring because the Ministry of Finance always allocates much less than the Ministry budgets for, and ends up increasing the funds during the year.

This budgetary over-run however, is in respect of Compensation because when it comes to Goods Services, there is either delayed releases or none at all, whilst for CapEx, there was no allocation whatsoever. This has made it almost impossible to carry out any meaningful infrastructural work, or purchase the necessary vehicles and office equipment.

The Committee hereby advices the Ministry of Finance to ensure that all extra funds allocated to the various ministries during the year, are fully catered for under the Budget presented during the Mid-Year Review.

III. Need for legal counsel

The Committee was informed that currently, each House of Chiefs is assigned one lawyer to help in handling cases but there is the need to have at least two in some regions due to the number of cases to be dealt with. Also, there is the need to get legal counsel for the six new regions. The Ministry therefore needs about twenty-two lawyers in total, and a bare minimum of six, if each region is to have one. The Committee recommends that the Ministry engage the Attorney-General's office with a request for lawyers to be posted to the various Houses of Chiefs.

IV. Amendment of L.I 798 and C.I 27 which specify the procedures for adjudication of disputes by Judicial Committees of Traditional Councils and various Houses of Chiefs

The Committee observed that the above-mentioned laws, which spell out the processes to resolve disputes have still not been reviewed. The Committee was informed that the Regional Houses of Chiefs are yet to submit their input, especially in the matter of increasing the Judiciary Committee membership from three to five. This is in order to ensure that there is always quorum for the Judicial Committee to adjudicate in an expeditious matter. This issue of quorum, the Committee was informed is one of the main causes for the delays in adjudicating cases.

The committee has advised the Ministry to increase its efforts in encouraging the stakeholders to quickly present their input, and complete the processes for the passage of these enactments as their completion will go a long way in assuaging various pockets of conflict.

Coupled with the issue of inadequate funding, the Committee also observed that even though the Ministry has disposed of many chieftaincy disputes, those pending far outnumber those disposed of, as shown in the table below:

8.0 CONCLUSION

The Committee wishes to reiterate that the Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs has a vital role to play in engendering national cohesion and maintaining peace, which are vital prerequisites for national growth and development. It is therefore imperative that the Ministry be well resourced. Therefore, while recommending that this House approve the total sum of Thirty-five million, seven hundred and thirty-nine thousand, two hundred and eighty-eight Cedis (GH¢ 35,739,288.00) for the operations of the Ministry of Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs during the 2021 Financial Year, the Committee hereby advices the Ministry of Finance to, as a matter of urgency, take a second look as the adjustments it made to the Ministry's budget and ensure it is well resourced to carry out its mandate.
